Together, Liberty Mutual and our employees contributed \$46 million to our communities last year and volunteered nearly 153,000 hours across 23 countries. Giving back is at the core of who we are. Ending youth homelessness, together

Young people who have to worry about their next meal can't focus on fulfilling their dreams. Instead of concentrating on school or career planning, their days are spent searching for a bed. They must cope with trauma from living on the streets and spend each day simply trying to survive. We salute their resilience and know that with support, they can thrive and excel.

Every year, an estimated 4.2 million young people experience the instability of homelessness.

To address this hidden epidemic, Liberty Mutual spent two years working closely with the city of Boston, schools, shelters and community nonprofits. Most importantly, we listened to young people who had experienced being homeless. We went beyond being a funder and became part of a community-wide collaboration to end youth and young adult homelessness.

Ensuring a better start

Early childhood education is one of the most effective ways to improve a child's long-term security and well-being. In 2019, **we nearly doubled our investment in such programs.** The new funding will significantly expand the number of available seats in these critically important prekindergarten programs, and help neighborhood-based centers compete for city funding and national accreditation.





Setting up for success

For underserved students, making the leap from high school to college can be especially challenging; many are the first in their families to even consider it. Today, more Boston students are successfully navigating that transition, thanks to the intensive support offered by our nonprofit community partners. This year, **Liberty Mutual increased its commitment to these programs significantly in the hopes of encouraging even more students to confidently pursue the training and skills that will unlock advanced degrees and competitive salaries.**

Welcoming a new superintendent

Quality public education is one of the most effective tools we have to ensure opportunity for all children. That's why, when new Superintendent of Boston Public Schools Dr. Brenda Cassellius launched her "listening tour," we were eager to help. Together with New England Blacks in Philanthropy and EdVestors, Liberty hosted a welcome reception where Dr. Cassellius could meet with civic leaders. The discussion surfaced fresh insights and gave Boston community leaders a chance to look at local issues of equity and inclusion through a national lens.

At Liberty Mutual, philanthropy is not just something we do—it's who we are. Every year, our employees serve, give and volunteer countless hours to help their communities. In total, 75% of all employees participated in Liberty Torchbearers programs in 2019.

Last spring, fully half of our employees participated in *Serve with Liberty*, our annual days of service, completing 2,538 projects across 23 countries. Additionally, 57% donated to charities of their choice through *Give with Liberty*, earning a 50% match from the company. 



Celebrating our employees' volunteering

Many Liberty employees volunteer on their own — sharing skills and expertise, serving on boards, or just lending a needed hand. In 2019, we were very pleased to recognize those efforts with the new **100 Club** for employees who log 100 or more volunteer hours. Members of the 100 Club can extend grants of \$2,500 or more to a nonprofit of their choice. All **Volunteer with Liberty** participants who track their volunteer hours are eligible to reward mini-grants. Together, Liberty employees directed over half a million dollars through these programs during the year.



Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC):
